SERIES: Gospel of John The Word Became Flesh

John 1:14-18

The Gospel is Embodied in Jesus (1:14)

- The eternal, personal, divine Word of God became flesh.
 - The eternal one entered into time.
 - o The invisible God became visible.
 - o The uncreated Son entered into His creation.
 - The holy God came to dwell among his <u>sinful</u> people.
 - The immortal divinity took on mortal **humanity**.
- It was essential for our salvation that Jesus would become a man.
 - If Jesus did not become a man, He could not be **tempted**.
 - o If Jesus did not become a man, He could not be an example.
 - o If Jesus did not become a man, He could not die.
 - We should never look at Bethlehem without seeing Calvary.
 - We should never contemplate the incarnation without our thoughts drifting to the crucifixion.
 - We should never think about the cradle without considering the <u>cross</u>.

The Gospel is Explained in Jesus (1:14-18)

- Jesus and the Tabernacle: "He dwelt among us." (14)
 - o In the OT, God lived among his people in a tent.
 - o In the NT, God came to live among his people in human flesh.
- Jesus and the Glory of God: "We have seen His glory." (14)
 - We can only see the fullness of God's glory in Jesus.
 - Moses was only allowed to see God's **back**.
 - Through Jesus, we now can see his **face**.
 - Jesus shows God's glory in being full of grace and truth.
- **Jesus and the Prophets**: "John bore witness about him." (15)
 - John the Baptist bore witness about Jesus.
 - John stands as the last of the OT prophets who prepared the way for Jesus.
 - Jesus is superior to John the Baptist because Jesus was <u>before</u> him.
- **Jesus and the Law**: "For the law was given to Moses. Grace and truth came through Jesus Christ." (16-17)
 - We can only receive grace from Jesus.
 - The law of Moses pointed to Jesus.
 - The law was a gift of grace for Israel because it pointed them to their need for a Savior.
 - Jesus is the greater gift of grace because he fulfilled the law and would truly save his people.
- **Jesus and the Father**: "He has made the Father known." (18)
 - We can only know the Father through Jesus.
 - The invisible God has now become visible.
 - God became man so that man could **know** God.

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
