SERIES: Gospel of John The Baskets and the Boat

John 6:1-21

The Messiah is Mightier than Moses (6:1-4)

- Notice the implicit comparisons between Jesus and Moses:
 - Jesus is followed by a <u>crowd</u> like Moses.
 - The crowd is following Jesus because they saw his **signs**.
 - Jesus goes up a mountain.
 - This event takes place during the **Passover** which celebrated Israel's deliverance from Egypt.
 - 1st Passover- Jesus' body is the **temple** that will be destroyed and raised in three days.
 - 2nd Passover- Jesus' flesh is the <u>bread</u> of life which must be broken to give life.
 - 3rd Passover- Jesus is crucified as the Passover lamb to die for his people's sins.
- These two miracles point to one big reality: Jesus is greater than Moses.

The Baskets: Jesus Miraculously Feeds His People (6:5-13)

- Jesus <u>tests</u> the faith of his disciples. (5-9)
 - The point of testing is not for God to learn something about **us**.
 - The point of testing is to reveal to us what we really think about **God**.
- Jesus <u>reveals</u> his power to his disciples. (10-11)
 - o No problem is a match for Jesus' power.
 - When Jesus supplies, it is never too <u>little</u>.
 - When Jesus supplies, everyone will be satisfied.
 - o Jesus is not only greater than Moses, but he is greater than **Elisha**. (2 Kings 4:42-44)
- Jesus **provides** for the needs of his disciples. (12-13)
 - Why does Jesus care about the leftover bread?
 - A personal lesson: Nothing of his will ever be <u>lost</u>. (John 6:39)
 - A national lesson: Jesus can supply the needs of all his people. (Phil. 4:19)

The Boat: Jesus Miraculously Crosses the Sea (6:16-21)

- As Moses led Israel across the Red Sea, Jesus crosses the sea with his disciples.
 - Notice the dark.
 - Darkness and night often occur when Jesus is absent. (John 3:2, 13:30).
 - Notice the wind.
 - Notice the storm.
 - John never mentions that Jesus calms the <u>storm</u>.
 - John is showing how Jesus calms our **fears**.
 - Notice their fear.
 - They are not afraid of the storm.
 - They are afraid of the **maker** of the storm.
 - Moses led the people to walk **through** water.
 - Jesus met his people by walking on water.
 - o Notice Jesus' claim.
 - Jesus says what Moses heard God say at the burning bush: "I Am."
 - The point of the story is not that God calms our storms, but that God gets into our **boat**.

Jesus: God-Sent Prophet or Man-Made Puppet? (6:14-15)

- The people want to make Jesus their king.
 - o "Jesus did not come to earth to be useful. He came to be **precious**." John Piper
 - o Jesus is not a puppet to be manipulated. He is the God to be worshiped.
- Jesus did not come to <u>give</u> bread for our stomachs. He came to <u>be</u> bread to satisfy our souls.
- Jesus entered into the great storm of our sin to ensure we would cross safely to the other side of **death**.

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
