<ul> <li>In John 9, Jesus encounters two types of blindness.</li> </ul>
<ul> <li>Blindness of the: The beggar suffers from physical blindness and cannot see the world.</li> </ul>
<ul> <li>Blindness of the: Pharisees suffer from spiritual blindness and cannot see the light of the world.</li> </ul>

<ul> <li>Specific sins in the world are usually not the cause of specific sufferings in the world.</li> </ul>
<ul> <li>Jesus teaches that suffering can only have ultimate meaning in relation to (3)</li> </ul>
<ul> <li>Specific sins in the past do not always correlate with specific suffering in the present.</li> </ul>

<ul> <li>Jesus would soon turn from a day-job of relieving suffering to a night-job of suffering himself. (5)</li> </ul>
The Power that Healed - What Jesus Did (9:6-7)
<ul> <li>Just as God used dirt to create man in the beginning, Jesus uses clay to a man's eyes.</li> </ul>
<ul> <li>Just as God sent Naaman to wash away his leprosy, Jesus sends the man to wash away his blindness.</li> </ul>
This is a picture of what God has done for all of his children.
He has opened our blind eyes to his glory. (2 Cor. 4:4-6)
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<ul> <li>He has washed our sins away to us for his glory. (Titus 3:5)</li> </ul>
The Perplexity of the People - What Jesus Stirred (9:8-12)
The people were asking the wrong question.
