  - Primary theme: Jesus is the eternal "Son of God."
  - Key verses: 1:1-14; 3:16; 20:30-31.
  - Theme verse: John 20:30-31 "Now Jesus did many other signs in the presence of the disciples, which are not written in this book; but these are written so that you may believe that Jesus is the Christ, the Son of God, and that by believing you may have life in his name."
