Past Grace: The Grace of God has Come (2:11)

- Grace motivates godliness.
- "Grace" does not refer here to the attributes of God, but to the Incarnation of Christ.
 - Grace is not just a divine pardon... it is a divine <u>Person</u>.
 - o Jesus Christ is not only God incarnate... he is **grace** incarnate!
- Salvation is available to all kinds of people.
 - Young and old...
 - Male and female...

 - Jew or Gentile...
 - Jesus is the Savior of the world. (1 John 4:14)

Present Grace: Grace Trains Us for Godliness (2:12)

- The same grace that saves also **sanctifies**.
- Grace brings repentance grace leads us to say "no" to sin.
- Grace brings reformation grace leads us to say "<u>yes</u>" to holiness.
 - Grace does not demand <u>perfection</u>.
 - Grace does require a new direction.

Future Grace: Grace Calls Us to Wait For the Hope of Glory (2:13-14)

- This glorious appearing refers to one person, not two.
 - Jesus is our great God.
 - He purchased us...
 - To purify us...
 - To possess us.
 - Jesus is our glorious <u>Savior</u>.
 - He died to save us from sin's penalty.
 - He rose to save us from sin's **power**.
 - He will return to save us from sin's **presence**.
- While we are waiting, we must be **working**.
 - Gospel grace produces gospel zeal.
 - Not only should we do good, but we should be <u>eager</u> to do good.
 - The gospel does not require obedience.
 - The gospel **produces** obedience.
